

Parashah Nitzavim

The one that focuses on the Israelites' covenant, the law that is meant to govern and shape the people of Israel in the Promised Land, with a strong emphasis on personal responsibility and the consequences of one's actions.

In Parashah Nitzavim, Moses gathers all the people of Israel, regardless of social status or age, to affirm publicly their covenant with God. - 3. **Your choices matter**: What you choose to do has consequences, not just for you, but also for your community and future generations. Try to make wise decisions.
- 4. **Include everyone**: Like Moses gathered all the people, remember to include and respect people from all backgrounds and ages in your circle. Unity is powerful.
- 5. **Keep traditions alive**: Just as the covenant was passed down, it's important to preserve your family's traditions and values. They connect you to your roots.
- 6. **You have a choice**: You have the power to choose your path in life. Your decisions shape your future, so think carefully. We may not be able to control everything that happens to us, but we can control how we respond. That is where free choice operates.
- 7. **Learn from mistakes**: Everyone makes mistakes. Parashah Nitzavim shows that it's never too late to make amends and turn things around. We are reminded that God is compassionate and forgiving, and it is never too late to make up for our mistakes.
- 8. **Support one another**: Your actions can affect your friends and community. Be there to support and guide one another.
- 9. **Choose a positive life**: Choose a life filled with positivity and growth, not negativity and problems. We can always choose how we respond to the circumstances in which we find ourselves.
